Exercises included, marked and memory retrieves, hunting and double marks, one of which was in the lake. The Junior Handlers were really keen to learn and find out exactly what it's all about. It was incredible watching the dogs work for the children.

Group 3 were experienced at running their own dogs and they had a training class in the field with Morton. Some of the less experienced children had time to watch for a moment and were clearly inspired by them.

We all stopped for a picnic lunch under the Poplar trees and soaked in the atmosphere. Westhide is a majestic woodland estate and the children seemed to love being at Westhide too.

After our picnic we all headed off to the big field and sat in the tall grass watching each group of children demonstrate their newly acquired dog handling skills. Some had never handled a dog before at all! It was quite something to see, a group of all ages and all sorts of personalities, each succeeding at their own level and in their own way. The training in the morning clearly had an impact on the children as it was evident to see the improvement in the afternoon. The children handled each task with confidence and great enthusiasm.

At the end of the day everyone was given a goody bag kindly sponsored by Pip at Sporting Saint, thank you Pip, a very generous bag of goodies. Thank you also to Laura Peakman from Skinners who arranged Certificates and another goody bag for all the children. This was a nice surprise and went down very well indeed.
